The role of the EU in health policy and in health system development

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EU competences for Health

(without food law)

Quality and safety of organs and blood	EU minimum standards
Resource prioritisation of organs and blood	member states
Organisation and health system development	member states, EU dialogue
public health (prevention, communicable diseases, Drogen	member states, EU dialogue

guiding principles of Health at EU level

legislation

- small area of harmonisation: pharmaceuticals and medical devices
- small area of minimum standards: blood and organs
- additional EU role in public health....
- ...excluding financial and organisational issues of health systems

budget

- small budget for action program on health: 55 Mill. €/year
- fairly high budget on EU health research through Horizon 2020
- potential EU financing for health infrastructure by structural funds

Influence of other EU policies on health

- Internal market
- Regional and Agricultural Policy
- Research
- European Semester/Open Method of Coordination
- EU/ECB/IMF-support for certain EURO states

Political framework of EU presidencies

- focus of EU 28, COM and EP on Presidency
- 6 months for a presentation of the country (achievements and challenges)
- special attention on ministers and staff as chairs
- possibility to set new topics and to start an EU process
- possibility to set a regional accent in external EU relations
- possibility to set new topics with EU support and to start a process on national level

examples for processes and accents

- EU process
 Dutch presidency on pharmaceutical questions
- EU external relations process
 Spanish Presidency: Barcelona process/Euromed
 Finnish Presidency: Northern Dimension
- national process enhanced by EU
 German Presidency: Together against HIV/AIDS
 Estonian Presidency: Alcohol policy

finding a top theme: criteria (overview)

- personal commitment of the minister? (1)
- embedded in existing EU processes? (2)
- integrated in the government program? (3)
- compatible with the Trio presidency program? (4)

criteria 1 personal commitment of the minister?

internal EU topic

- collecting of core topics in national health policy
- scanning of **EU relevance** of the topic, derived from that definition of aims (legislation or dialogue?)

external EU topic

- definition of target areas in external relations
- bilateral contact with target states on ministers level
- possibly invitation to Informal Ministers Council

criteria 2 embedded in existing EU processes?

- trade-off between continuing other topics and starting new processes
- topics in non-harmonised fields are necessarily focussing on dialogue and produce less tangible results
- abstract topics can cause dry debates
- topics in full consensus with EU Commission diminuish the visibility of the Presidency
- European Parliament needs to be integrated in the plannings and the program

criteria 3

integrated in the government program? (1)

- simple messages across ministerial boundaries increase the overall message of the Presidency,...
- ...but a fully integrated approach reduces the visibility of the Ministry.

example German Presidency 2007:

Interministerial Task Force being occupied with **organisational questions**; content decisions often handled inside the ministries

example Estonian Presidency 2017:

digital innovation as cross-cutting issue for all participating ministries

criteria 4 compatible with the Trio Presidency program?

- Trio Presidency as a new instrument to enhance mid-term planning and coordination
- dense contacts on political and technical level
- challenge: handling of different interests of Trio partners
